PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE





We laid out our direction and strategies for the next 3 years (from 2021) and articulated them under 3 pillars and 7 strategies. The 3 pillars represent the area of work that the Association is directly responsible for as the sport governing body. They are corporate governance, value adding to the sport and the continuous effort to build the ecosystem. Under each pillar, key strategies are mapped out for the next 3 years in order to achieve our vision.

Under corporate governance, we continue to strive to achieve sustainability, efficiency and effectiveness in the day-to-day running of the Association; and to create a more vibrant handball scene in Singapore via more engagement with the local fraternity, as well as more opportunities and stronger ties with the counterparts in the Southeast Asia region.

As the sport governing body, Handball Singapore will take a more proactive role in developing and raising the standards of local coaches and officials, create a synchronised and vibrant events calendar with more opportunities to play and learn, and to sustain a healthy pool and stream of players in the pipeline. One of the new strategies is to create a sustainable pipeline in Singapore to increase the talent pool that can be identified for the National Teams.

Another new initiative is to partner private academies and ActiveSG to build our ecosystem. Industry players are deemed as valuable partners of the Association and multipliers for pipeline and ecosystem development of the sport.





MEDICAL DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE



It has been a privileged to be part of the team to set up the inaugural medical committee for the Handball Federation of Singapore. We have worked with the national team for almost 6 months. We set up the medical committee with a team of dedicated and experienced physiotherapists just before the 31st SEA Games Hanoi 2022. In our very first task, we identified nutritional concerns, conditioning issues and tried to optimize the players as much and as fast as possible to get ready for the Game. The coaching HFS committee, coaching team and players were supportive and receptive of our participation. We were very appreciative of the support and look forward to a long and fruitful journey.

Competitive nationwide and sports internationally have escalated to a new height. No longer are athletes just eating 'well' and 'training hard' for competitions. Competitions have reached such intense levels that conventional approaches are insufficient to win medals. Sports science, sports nutrition, sports physiology and sports psychology are crucial elements needed to optimize athletes performance for them achieve to peak performances at the right time.

The medical committee has recently initiated a high-performance review and approach to improve the performance of the athletes. We are confident that we will see improved results in the near future.

Over the past 6 months, our medical committee has grown rapidly. We now have a core of physiotherapists, strengthening conditioning coaches, sports massage therapists, additional upper shoulder and elbow surgeon to support the national handball players! The team will provide comprehensive and speedy treatment and therapy to get players back to action. We have implemented a workflow to reduce turnaround time to get players back to court again. All these would not have been possible without the open communication between players, coaches and then medical committee.

It has been a tough 2 years living with covid amidst the Covid-19 pandemic. restrictions in training and exposure competitions, competitive athletes have had a 2.5 years. Without high level challenging international games to participate, many players lose their competitive edge despite rigorous training. We are seeing an increasing relaxation of Covid measures, we are seeing more competition resuming and we will see the true potential of our dedicated athletes in the very near future! The medical committee is excited and stand together, ready to support the Handball Federation of Singapore in their pursue of perfection!

MEDICAL TEAM - PHYSIO KAREN'S MESSAGE



The journey of forming the medical committee is a needs basis. It started when Starbalm (represented by Joel) approached Justin for a collaboration for products. Justin was also keen as the National Men's team were flying to Saudi for Asian Championship in January 2022.

Joel approached me (Subject Matter Expert for Starbalm), to have a session to educate the team on taping and the use of the product. During the teaching session, we realized that men's team carried quite a bit of injury and would require an unfathomable amount of tape.

After discussion with Justin, a formal medical team was setted up for Handball Singapore. Our aim was the coming SEA Games in May for both the mens and women team. February was the formalising of the medical team in action. I had a team of trainers to come every training session for both the mens and women teams.

The main purpose of the team is to manage the injuries on the grounds with the supervision of the Physiotherapist. The Sports trainers led by Nithiya R and Jarryl Kiu were deployed to training sessions to support the players with taping techniques and daily injury management analysis from each training for each player

A team of Physiotherapist is also formed. Karen leading the female team with Alison Tan and Regina while Wee Heng and, Luo Zi Yang for the Mens. Dr Lim Chin Tat has also agreed to be the Medical Director for Handball Singapore to assist and oversee all the players. Dr Lim and Karen led a monthly multidisciplinary team of captains, coaches, trainers, and Dr Lim to discuss the medical needs and performance of each SEA Game player

- 1) Weekly massages/physio sessions were also offered by Get Moving to players since March 2022, Items such as theraguns, dynamic tapes, massage beds were all purchased for the sole purpose of supporting the team in April.
- 2) After SEA Games, the medical committee and the board had many rounds of discussion to redevelop the team with clear outcomes based player selection protocols. The periodization cycle is also further enhanced with both the medical, sports science, coaches and the board overseeing the current and development teams.
- 3) These includes protocols set in place such as pre-assessment screenings, daily analysis of player's parameters and integrated management by ortho/psychologists/physios (Jul 2022)
